Unit 3: (November – December) Introduction of props and story in advanced exercises. Assessment components Assignment 1: Training (Suzuki influenced modalities) Assessment Method: Physical demonstration Description: An in-depth study and physical investigation of the training modalities of Tadashi Suzuki. This training will continue through the arc of the semester. Students will be graded on their level of focus demonstrated throughout the length of each specific class with an amphasis on their attention to detail in

Students will be graded on their level of focus demonstrated throughout the length of each specific class with an emphasis on their attention to detail in regards to the physical form, focus/attention, and effort required in each exercise.

Assignment 2: Personal Reflection and Observations

Assessment Method: Written

Description: Students will be required to record their progress and observations of the work of other students in an in-class journal. Based on feed back throughout the semester (both to the student and to other students in class) each individual will have to offer a personal assessment of their work in the class, as well as an accurate account of missed classes and late arrivals to class. From this journal they will draft a 500 word – word format document outlining their progress and suggest a grade level they feel they are working at. Note: the grade suggested by the student does not constitute or dictate the final grade submitted by the instructor.

Weight: 10%

Due Date: December 3, 2021

<u>Assignment 3:</u> Final Essay Assessment Method: Written

Description: Each student will draft a 1000-word essay outlining their understanding of the training and its relevance to both the Acting Class and Voice class that they are taking. In some cases, there will be students who are not enrolled in Acting or Voice in which case the student must articulate a relevance of the philosophies explored in class to other aspects of study or life.

Weight: 10%

<u>Assignment 4:</u> Participation – Growth - Preparation

Assessment Method: observatory in nature.

Description: An evaluation of an individual student's focus, concentration and effort in class – demonstrating concern and accountability toward the objectives and exercises presented to the group. This grade stems from an individual 's demonstrated ability and is gauged on the arc of improvement throughout the entire class, but also the singular investment and care in the progress of the ensemble. This component will be further explained in class.

Preparation is connected to the student's readiness for the work at hand. Student's will be required to arrive warmed up and stretched for the beginning of class.

Participation includes but is not limited to the power of observation when others are working and the ability and willingness to offer feedback and critical response. In addition to these assessed components the student's attendance in class will also fall under this criterion. See Assessment Expectations for more information.
