Description: Students will submit a written critique on a locally produced Canadian

play. (1000 words)

Research paper and presentation:

Value: 20%

Due Date: Due dates assigned at the end of January.

Type: Research and Presentation.

Description: Students will individually research and write up a production history of a contemporary Canadian play (writen within the last 15 or 20 years), discuss its significance, and offer a strengths/weaknesses analysis. The student will present to the class, and turn in a 1500 word paper. Play selection must be approved by the

instructor prior to beginning the assignment.

Participation:

Type: Attendance and class participation
