Course description	This course frames performance creation through both devised theatre methodologies and issue-based dialogues, focusing primarily on the environmental effects and philosophies that stem from an examination of climate change. Students will engage in a collaborative worldbuilding process, deploying the genre of science fiction to create

	<p>worlds of the future that are reckoning with the progression of the climate crisis. Utilizing a myriad of devising and worldbuilding techniques, students will generate content that will then serve as source material for the creation of both solo and group performances.</p>

Generate creative content and material through an issue-based lens 2. Develop and structure collaborative process through prompts that integrate individual offerings with group practice 3. Create devised performances using a variety of conceptual and practical techniques 4. Frame and deploy science fiction as a forward thinking and reflective tool that adopts an activist perspective 5. Apply ideas and practices of eco-scenography and the integration of found/upcycled materials into process

<p>Assessment components</p>	<p>1) Class Participation: 30% of overall grade</p> <p>All students are expected to attend all classes, arrive on time and fully prepared (having completed all assigned readings and/or written responses), and participate actively in all sections of each class.</p> <p>Criteria for assessment will include attendance, demonstrated preparation, active participation, collaboration, creativity, and respectful exchange. A more detailed rubric of participation grading will be posted on D2L.</p> <p>Note: Given the importance of this aspect of the course, students for whom active in-class participation is difficult or impossible should identify themselves to the instructors within the first 2 weeks of classes.</p> <p>2) Character Exploration (Written Assignment): 20% of overall grade A detailed description of this assignment will be distributed in the 4th week of the semester and maintained on D2L.</p> <p>Due Date: October 11, 2022</p> <p>3) Solo Presentation (Performance Assignment): 20% of overall grade A detailed description of this assignment will be distributed in the 7th week of the semester and maintained on D2L.</p> <p>Presentations held on November 1 and 3, 2022.</p> <p>4) Group Presentation (Performance Assignment): 30% of overall grade A detailed description of this assignment will be distributed in the 9th week of the semester and maintained on D2L.</p> <p>Presentations held on November 29, 2022 and December 1, 2022.</p>
