Course description	This course invites undergraduate students to begin to understand the multitude of ways that theatre engages with various forms of technology. Through lecture, discussion, case studies, readings, and lab-focused hands-on application, students will build foundational knowledge of the historical and current uses of staging sound, lighting, and multimedia technologies.
	In order to broaden the students' skill sets, we will explore vocabulary, planning
	process, design and creative practices, while examining specialized approaches
	relating to these established and emerging theatrical technologies.
	A special focus will be placed on cutting-edge lighting and projection technologies
	and the use of Augmented Reality and Virtual Reality in live theatrical
	performance, and the ways these technologies are opening up new modes of storytelling and technological design.

Course learning outcomes

By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:

- **Identify** a broad spectrum of technologies used in theatrical practices, both historical and current (staging, lighting, sound, multimedia/mixed reality)
- **Comprehend** basic relevant vocabulary, as well as workflow practices specifically related to lighting and multimedia technologies used in theatrical performance
- Demonstrate/create simple implementations of theatre technologies in a performance context
- Analyze/evaluate the impact of creative technologies on a theatrical production
- **Communicate** clearly about historical and current theatre technologies, their practical application, and the artistic/creative process of implementation
- **Formulate** a basic approach for using one or more relevant technologies within a theatrical context
- **Identify** and speak about the work of historical and contemporary theatre practitioners as it relates to relevant technologies.

Course schedule

First Class: Jan. 12, 2023 **Last Class:** April 6, 2023

There will be no class on April 6th.

Students will be expected to attend one live theatrical event as the case study for Assignment 1. Details TBC.

Pending approval and scheduling, the class will visit one of Calgary's pre-eminent theatres for a tour of the facilities and technologies.

January: Introduction to Historical and Contemporary Theatrical Technologies (Staging, Sound, Lighting, Multimedia)

February: Contemporary Theatrical Technologies, Emerging Theatrical Technologies

March: Contemporary Theatrical Technologies, Emerging Theatrical Technologies, Presentations, Review

April: Review, Presentations

Assessment components

Quizzes:

There will be two guizzes marked and graded by the instructor.

Historical Theatre Technology: Feb 2, 2023 (15%)

Contemporary Theatre Technology: March, 2, 2023 (15%)

For Participation, and Assignments 1 & 2, students will be required to provide a self-assessment that includes thoughtful reflection on their work and a numerical grade, to be handed in with their assignment. This assessment will be read and responded to by the instructor, who will either confirm the final grade or modify it in conversation with the student. Students will be provided with detailed criteria and a self-assessment rubric as part of the assignment outline.

Assignment 1:

Assessment Method: Self-assessment

Description: Journal entry. Focusing on a specific theatrical performance, students will provide a 500-1000 word journal entry that identifies theatre technologies engaged with in the production, why they might have been utilized, and their impact on the storytelling and audience experience.

Weight: 20%

Due Date: March 10, 2023 @ 11:59 pm

Assignment 2: Creative Project (subject to change depending on available venue)

Assessment Method: Self-assessment

Description: In groups, students will have an opportunity to present a micro theatrical performance that engages extensively with one element of theatre technology. Performances should be between 5 and 10 minutes. Each student will individually produce a short paper of 1000 to 1500 words surveying their project from ideation to outcomes.

Weight: 40%

Due Dates: Presentations in class on March 23 & March 30 (25%), Written

Component April 6, 2023 (15%)

Participation

Assessment Method: Self-Assessment

Value: 10%

Student participation evaluation will be based on in-class opportunities to engage. If the student cannot attend in-person, meaningful comments via D2L prompts in response to the class conversation, are acceptable forms of participation. Participation will be self-assessed at beginning of the term (goals for the term), mid-term, and end of term. Detailed instruction will be provided in-person and in a *Participation Reflection* guideline document that will be posted to D2L.

Assessment expectations
