Course description	Clownlife Block Week: This class investigates the art and practice of clown for			
·	performance and life on and off the stage. Introducing the core aspects of Clowning,			
	derived from a diverse range of performance practices and aesthetics within the art of			
	Clowning from around the world. This course will focus on the foundations of clowning			
	including performance, self-research, presence, connection, self-expression, optimism,			
	honesty, risk-taking, listening with the whole body, vulnerability, confidence, humour,			
	failing well, also known as the flop, major/ minor, improvisation, complicity on stage and			
	how all of these are great tools for performance and for life. Some of the conventions			
	explored shall be through but not limited to performance, improvisation, movement,			
	dance, voice, physical exploration of the body, eye contact, honest expression and			
	physical theatre.			
Course learning	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:			
outcomes	1. Stand authentically in front of an audience with eye contact and breath.			
	2. Viscerally know what it means to be "in connection" with one's audience and			
	colleagues on stage, embodying a strong understanding of listening with the whole body.			
	3. Embody and physicalise expression, rhythm, sound and emotion.			
	4. Understand Major and Minor roles.			
	5. Understand the oscillation of "the flop/ failing well".			
	6. Be present, dedicated and engaged in performance.			
	7. Gain a strong awareness of oneself and the relationship one has with their			
	environment.			
	8. Strengthen a willingness to take risks on stage.			
	9. Practice a healthy and respectful way of communicating and collaborating both in			
	group dynamics and as an audience/ class member. Understanding why and how			
	engagement both on and off stage is paramount to the research and development of			
	new work.			

10. Understand the different aesthetics, lineages and practices of clowning. Course schedule Unit One: Presence, Pleasure in the Game and Following Curiosity This unit will explore presence on stage while also identifying the individual's experience in the game, strengthening one's ability to follow their authentic joy and curiosity on stage. Unit Two: Connection "Dropping it"- the power of Eye Contact, Breath, Emotion, **Tension and Release on Stage** This unit will address the potency of presence, awareness and connection on stage. Investigating our breath and dropping into our truth to invite a closer connection with the audience. We will be researching tension and release in comedy and the influence breath and release has on our body and the body of our audience in free form improvisation. This unit will also be exploring the knowledge of body impulse, "listening with the whole body", exploring emotional range and "dropping it," a clown term that invites the performer to let the audience into the embodied truth of their experience and world. Unit Three: Improvisation & Performance/ Major & Minor Exploration of comedic improvisation in groups, this Unit will expand on the resources gained from previous units. Researching major and minor roles for a more clearly defined improvisational performance, through a range of clown free-form and improvisational exercises. Unit Four: The Flop/ Failing Well on Stage This unit will introduce the concept of the flop and offer practice in the oscillation of the flop as a means to bring the audience into closer connection with the performer. This unit will play with classic clown tropes, improvisational performance and group devising for stage/class performance.

Assessment components

Assignment 1: Daily Warm-Up and Games

Weight: 30%

Due Date: on-going

Assessment Method: Presence and Level of Engagement

Description:

An introduction to the physical and vocal exercises of clowning. Students will move through various games and practices to develop presence, malleability, curiosity, full expression and the pleasure to play in the game. Although this is listed as a formal assignment, students will be evaluated on in-class progress of the above-mentioned components as this is essential to the effective training and visceral understanding of clowning as a contemporary performance practice. Please note warm-ups and games will take place at the beginning of every class; lateness will negatively impact this mark.

Assignment 2: Clown Turn

Weight: 30%

Due Date: September 2nd, 2022

Assessment Method: Level of engagement both in preparation and performance; students will be marked on their individual ability to demonstrate the embodied practice of the performance resources learned throughout the course and their individual contribution to devising work within a team.

Description:

Students will be asked to prepare a group clown turn (performance) and to present their work in front of the class on the final day. Please note: groups will be assigned in class on Day 4. Students will be marked on their ability to demonstrate their comprehension and embodied practice of the components researched and taught throughout the course. Students will develop a "connected" clown turn that moves forward, clearly demonstrating major and minor roles with a clear beginning, middle and end.

Assignment 3: Personal Reflection (500 words)

Weight: 10%

Due Date: September 2nd, 2022, midnight

Assessment Method: Demonstrating an awareness and vocabulary of the work, students

are asked to write a reflective response to the questions below.

Description:

Students are asked to write a personal reflection about the work (no more than 500 words) answering these questions:

1. What do you find most challenging about this work?

2. What about this work invokes curiosity and intrigue in you? And why?

<u>Participation - Growth - Preparation</u>

Weight: 30%

Due Date: Ongoing

Description: An evaluation of an individual student's attendance, focus, concentration, and effort in class – demonstrating concern and accountability toward the objectives and

exercises presented to the group.

This grade demonstrates an individual's engagement, participation and preparation throughout the course gauged on an arc of growth as a participant, a performer and an audience member in support of class colleagues.

Preparation is connected to the work one must do outside of class in order to arrive ready for the work. Appropriate clothing and costume homework will be taken into account; please see guidance for appropriate clothing below.

Participation includes but is not limited to observation when others are working and the willingness to offer feedback and critical response when appropriate. In addition to these assessed components, the student's attendance in class will also fall under this criterion – see below for further definition of this.

Please note – cell phones, iPads and computers are not permitted in class in any form, or manner, even during breaks. If a cell phone is needed during a break, the student must leave the class. Any cell phones seen in class will negatively impact the Growth – Participation – Preparation grade. Please come with a notebook and pen or pencil in which to take notes.

Appropriate Clothing

Much of the work in this class is physical in nature therefore proper *neutral* movement clothes are required; no dresses or skirts or short shorts. Please wear clothes that allow for flexibility in movement, being on the floor; please dress in layers. Make sure to have a pair of socks at every class, as well as indoor shoes if needed.

Costumes

Students will be asked to bring a variety of costume options from Day 2 of the course. A student's care, thought and resourcefulness in regards to costume attire will be considered in the mark of Participation – Growth - Preparation. Costumes must be culturally and physically appropriate for class settings and it is expected that students bring a handful of options. Please note we will be using costumes throughout the course. ie. Wigs, hats, fabrics, halloween costumes, vintage clothing, etc. are recommended.

Assessment expectations

<u>Guidelines for Submitting Assignments:</u> All written assignments are to be emailed **in Microsoft Word document** to the Instructor.

<u>Missed or Late Assignments:</u> The deadline for the written assignment is set and stated above. There will be no extensions offered for any in-class or written assignments. Missed or late assignments will result in a 0% for those components of the class.

Attendance and Participation Expectations: Attendance is a key component of the work; it is vital that students are in the room working. As a block week course, it is paramount to the work that students arrive on time and stay for the duration of the class. As the training in clown strongly focuses on presence, engagement and participation, not to mention that every component of the work builds on the last, it is vital both to the work and the individual's progress to be in attendance. Any missed class will negatively impact the overall mark as it contributes to both the daily warm-ups and games component as well as the Participation - Growth- Preparation portions of the class. As this work compounds one exercise upon the other, it will be very difficult for a student to make up the difference when they miss a class. Any missed class with notification will result in a drop of the Participation grade by 5%. Any un-notified absence will result in a drop in grade point – ie, from a B to a B-. As a block week course it is paramount that students arrive ready and on time.

All matters of attendance can and will be evaluated at the discretion of the instructor.

Criteria That Must Be Met To Pass

Expectations for attendance:

The growth of students, both individual and collective, is directly connected to attendance – attendance is mandatory. Without prior notice to the instructor, lateness or absence will negatively impact the participation and growth grade. The class starts on time and is indicated when the door is closed; any student arriving after this point will be counted "late". Three lates count to one absence. Acceptance of all excuses is at the discretion of the instructor.

Expectations for Writing:
