	As this is a movement class, students are required to wear loose fitting or athletic style clothing allowing full freedom of movement to classes. In addition, students are encouraged to wear athletic or work gloves for the sword unit.

Supplementary fees	Optional: Students wishing to test for Basic Actor Combatant Certification with The Academy of Fight Directors will need to arrange additional instruction hours and testing fees with the instructor
Course description	This course is an introduction to the fundamental sills and concepts of staged violence.
	The emphasis of this course will be on the development of the core techniques of stage combat and the application of those techniques within a performance scenario. Focus will be given to partnering, accuracy, and the discipline required to protect the actor and their instrument when engaged in staged violence. Disciplines of stage combat explored in this class will be Unarmed/Hand to Hand and
	Single Sword.
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: 1. Perform choreographed violence with sufficient precautions to reliably keep themselves and their partners safe 2. Demonstrate knowledge of fundamental terminology and techniques of stage
	combat 3. Demonstrate knowledge of the practices necessary to develop character and facilitate story progression through physical altercation in performance 4. Perform and analyze dramatic scenes demonstrating a comprehension of dramatic structure and incorporation of stage combat techniques and principles
Assessment	Course assignments will consist of two practical performance exams, as well one short
components	essay and a written exam. Class performance in regard to partnering and skill development will also be graded.
	Assignment 1: Class Work & Participation Value: 20% Description: Stage combat is a partnered discipline, as such attendance and
	participation in class work is critical to the success of both you and your partners.

Students will be observed during class for skill growth, attention to safety, and partnering ability.

Assignment 2: Performance Exam: Unarmed Final Scene

Value: 25%

Due Date: June 13

Description: In class performance examination consisting of the performance of an assigned scene along with choreography learned in class. Assessment will be made on the students ability to successfully execute assigned choreography, attention to safety, partnering ability, and commitment to the context of the scene.

Assignment 3: Essay

Value: 10%

Due Date: June 18

Description: Students will be required to write a short essay (approximately 750 words) exploring how the violence, in a text of their choosing, drives the action in the text and what are the character motivations or intentions behind the engagement in violence.

Assignment 4: Performance Exam: Single Sword

Value: 25%

Due Date: June 22

Description: In class performance examination consisting of the performance of a student selected scene (with instructor approval) along with choreography learned in class. Assessment will be made on the students ability to successfully execute assigned choreography, attention to safety, partnering ability, and commitment to the context of the scene.

Assignment 5: Written Exam

Value: 20%

Due Date: June 22

Description: Students will write an in class examination testing their knowledge of terminology and concepts covered in class and contained within the glossary contained within the course pack. The exam will consist of multiple choice, short answer, and matching questions.

Guidelines for Submitting Assignments:

Performance assessments are conducted in class with a partner.

Written work is to be handed in as hard copy. Instructor preference is for type written/printed material, however, hand written material is acceptable if legible. Any references in written work should adhere to either APA or MLA format.

Criteria That Must Be Met To Pass:

Students will need to demonstrate understanding of the material covered in class as well as an ability to perform assigned choreography safely.

Expectations for Writing:

SCPA Claim Your Seat Program: Student Guidelines	 The Claim Your Seat (CYS) program allows all University of Calgary students to attend oncampus School of Creative and Performing Arts (Dance, Drama and Music) events free of charge. Depending on the performance, there is a limited number of seats available for CYS. There is not a guarantee that tickets will be available for all CYS patrons for every performance, based on audience size, demand, etc. CYS tickets are a privilege. If a student receives a ticket to attend a performance, it is expected that they will respect the value of the admission and attend the performance. Process for students: On the date of the performance, from the time the Box Office opens until 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, they arrive to the CYS table next to the Box Office and show their Unicard. If students arrive after 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, they can go to the Box Office and purchase a ticket at the student rate. Students should not go to the Box Office unless they are purchasing a ticket. If students have a course requirement to attend a performance for a specific date, access to the tickets will be communicated by the instructor to University Theatre Services prior to the event. The best guarantee for a free ticket is to arrive early, up to 45 minutes prior to the performance start time. Respect for the Front of House and theatre staff, performers and fellow patrons is an
	absolute requirement. Failure to comply with this will lead to being asked to leave the venue and could result in the revoking of CYS privileges.
