Course description	<p>Intro to on-camera technique & creation of the solo show:</p> <p>Drama 500 is the culmination of a series of advanced acting courses in drama. Students engage in the integration and embodiment of creative and technical resources while acquiring methodologies for advanced research in performance practice. The focus on individual skills in these modules will be balanced by attention to selected collaborative practice. This course will be strongly orientated toward professional performance technique including on-camera work and the creation of original solo work. Outside class rehearsals and performances are requirements for this course.</p>
Course learning outcomes	<p>By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Display development of agency and integration of acting techniques at an advanced level both as individual artists and collaborating members of an ensemble. • Demonstrate and employ a range of techniques and strategies for

	<p>exploring on-camera performance.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Demonstrate an understanding of the basics of self-producing and web-series work for the actor and its role in the Canadian context for the self-employed artist • Employ a range of research methodologies for creation of original performance as well as the interpretation of texts/prompts that address character and the environment to illuminate the acting process. • Demonstrate skillfulness in the application of body, breath, and other techniques that add to the fulfillment of the actor's craft • Master expectations for both personal and shared rehearsal, including generation of devised material for solo work as well as the interpretation of texts representing a range of styles and modes • Practice strategies for reflection and self-assessment that support artistic practice.

Assessment components	<p>Unit 1: Intro to On-Camera & the Pitch Value 30%</p> <p>This module offers students the skills to approach a given scene with the understanding of performance, story, character, relationship, and technical skills to do on-camera auditioning and acting on-set, and an introduction into creating and pitching their own independent film as content-creators.</p> <p><u>Project #1: Presentation of set of Scenes/Mock Auditions: 20% (2 to 3 sets for the duration of the course)</u></p> <p>Finding Freedom and Authenticity for the Actor - Engagement and implementation of these skills (10%)</p> <p>Deciphering of SIDES - story arc, beats, character development, relationships, environment, tone and style of project (5%)</p> <p>Technical considerations of working on camera, and auditioning (5%)</p> <p><u>Project #2: One Sheet - Pitch for a Web-Series or Short Film 10%</u></p> <p>Clarity of concept, synopsis, target audience and demographic</p> <p>Team Building and Collaboration</p> <p>Unit 2: Solo Show Value 70%</p> <p><u>Idea Development / Presentation 10%</u></p> <p>This written document will outline a performance structure within the first third of our time together. Idea Development will include thematic considerations, stylistic choices, and a 'long-list' of potential ideas that will help form the Solo Performance. These ideas will be presented verbally to the class and should be justifiable within a student's chosen theme.</p> <p><u>Material Development / Presentation 15%</u></p> <p>Material development will give (at least) two opportunities to perform and present the development of ideas to the class in the middle third of our time together. These development opportunities may include spoken monologue/dialogue, physical development ideas, or interactive trials. Each presentation will be accompanied by a written document that outlines the intent of the presentation (beforehand) and a reflection of the presentation (afterwards).</p> <p><u>Outside Eye Observation 10%</u></p> <p>Each student will be assigned to serve as a dramaturgical support for the Idea and Material Development of one other student. In this written document, students will offer feedback and reflections for one of their classmates. This feedback will</p>

	<p>draw on ideas of Critical Response Process (formalized by Liz Lerman) with the intention of being respectful, additive offerings. This element is pivotal in understanding the construction of performances from another artistic angle.</p> <p><u>Final Showing 20%</u> December 10th as part of the Performance Marathon</p> <p>An artistic presentation of the material created throughout the semester. Students should be able to demonstrate ideas, formulas, and techniques described in class in a clearly organized, artistic manner. Final Showings should only use technical elements that can be run by the performer - without outside technical assistance. A more detailed breakdown of the Final Showing will be presented during the term.</p> <p><u>Growth / Participation 15%</u></p> <p>Participation will include logistics such as arriving on time, and being focused and present during class time, but will also encompass the less tangible elements of bravery, fortitude, and resilience. Students will be expected to demonstrate safe practices for themselves and their classmates and are encouraged to express their needs throughout this class. Students will self-assess their work, effort and growth throughout the class through a written reflection (1500-3000 words).</p>
<p>Assessment expectations</p>	<p><u>Guidelines for Submitting Assignment</u></p> <p>Assignment deadlines will be established and communicated on Day 1 of the module.</p> <p><u>Criteria That Must Be Met to Pass</u></p> <p>All units and components must be completed in order to receive a pass for this course. Each student will also be allowed 3 free late days (24 hour period) which they can use through the course without penalty. After those days have been used, deductions will be applied as follows: Late written assignments will be subject to a 10% per-day-past-deadline penalty. Late performance presentations will be discussed on a case-by-case basis between the student and the instructor.</p>
