	professional practice and current industry standards. There will also be a portfolio		
	requirement for each student in the course.

	Note: Each project will be looked at as a whole. It is largely an artificial exercise to		
	divide design into small bits that can be evaluated separately. However, for the		
	purpose of this class greater emphasis will be placed on process oriented skills rather		
	than outcome. The theoretical pedagogy is to have the student focus on process with		
	the understanding that good process is the best way to lead to good outcomes.		
	Professionalism is critical to success in this course and will be discussed at length.

Value: 25%

Conceptual sketches and research plan and artistic process plan in place for the

production(s) to which you are assigned.

Area 2: Communication

Value: 25%

Due Date: TBA on production schedule needs

Description:

All documentation provided to directors, designers, stage managers, production manager and technical staff should be documented and submitted. Essentially this is your Show Bible, where all your notes, drawings, cue sheets etc. are kept in an orderly manner. This will be something you will bring to every Wednesday meeting and we will discuss. Models, costume renderings, swatches, sound samples and light plots will also be included in this grading area.

Area 3: Professionalism

Value: 15%

Due Date: Ongoing

Description:

You are only as good as your NEXT gig. Professionalism is the quality that will have you asked back to a theatre multiple times. It means being ready, open, communicative and cool-headed. While these might seem like personality traits, I assure you these are skills that can be learned and are best learned when practiced. Other considerations in this area are preparedness, punctuality, verbal communication and performance at production meetings and rehearsals.

Assignment 4: Execution

Value: 10%

Due Date: One week after opening night

Description:

A final assessment of your work. This will be submitted to the instructor as an essay on the process of designing the production(s) outlining your process pre-production, your production process evaluation and your final summary of the production itself. The idea is that you evaluate if the goals you set out to achieve were achieved in whole or in part or at all; followed by a critical assessment in your contribution to their success or failure.

Final Project: Portfolio

Value: 25%

Due Date: Powerpoint: March 15<sup>th</sup>, 2017; Website: April 13, 2017

Details:

Each student will create a portfolio of their work. Students will be asked to create a wordpress website with samples of their work with a CV and Bio. Students will submit a powerpoint slide show of work they have done to their peers. The idea is to have your ready to get out there working after you are finished here!!!

#### FOR GRADED DANCE STUDIO COURSES

- A significant part of your grade is based on participation. Participation means not only showing up for class, but also attending to the material at hand with effort and engagement.
- With regard to participation, classes are considered equivalent to assignments.
   Thus, more than 1, 2, or 3 (fill in based on how many times the class meets per week)
   absences per term will have an adverse effect on your final grade.
- If you miss more than one week of classes, your final grade will begin to drop by as much as 10% per missed class.
- If you miss more than two weeks of classes, you have the potential to fail the course.
