Course Description Drama 564, Drama Education is a course that explores through research and stude practice, the nature and function of drama education across a variety of age levels are learning environments. Structuring learning activities, developing classrood environments and controls, empowering students, eliciting experience, fostering aesthetic awareness, assessment strategies, developing strategies to teach dram skills and produce performances are elements of teaching drama that will be explored.
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Course Objectives The class work and assignments are designed to:
 Provide practical experience in lesson planning and delivery.
Develop competencies in classroom management
 Develop strategies for class design, budgeting, choosing plays and setting season.
4. Explore assessment strategies.
5. Provide a historical perspective of Drama Education
6. Develop a personal teaching philosophy.
7. Provide opportunity to observe and evaluate forms of drama education.

Course Activities The class will be involved in: Creating facility and supplies lists and Content Creating and presenting lesson plans and evaluations/rubrics Developing management techniques 4. Developing play lists and seasons 5. Creating a collective for presentation 6. Visitations and personal observations of various drama classes 7. Creation of a skills/areas of work list 8. Creation of a personal readings list 9. Assigned readings, evaluations and presentations of findings as below 10. Comparing and evaluating various teaching philosophies and styles, leading to beginning development of a personal teaching philosophy. READINGS: There will be assigned readings throughout the term. These readings will be from various teaching resources and the Alberta Education Drama Course Outlines (available on-line). Students should try to find a copy of Brian Way's *Development* through Drama, though this is difficult as it is out of print.

Assessment

Fall term: drama for Division III, IV students including improvisation, organization, collective writing and presentation, lesson plan development, teaching methods and seminar development. Research for paper including school visits

Winter term: drama for Division III, IV students including working with and directing children, yearly, unit and lesson plan creation, play selection, director's notebook, teaching methods

Drama for Division I, II students will be addressed if so directed by class interests. Students who wish to learn how to create workshops and drama camps outside of Alberta Education: students will be directed by class and personal/professional development interests.

Marks for the Participation section of the grade will be based on the instructor's observation and assessing the following areas:

- 1. Willingness and commitment to the work.
- 2. Organization and readiness to present.
- 3. Preparation, diligence and development of skills.
- 4. Generosity, respect for and ability to work well with others.
- 5. Successful integration and application of learned skills.
- 6. Ability to listen to suggestions and constructive criticism.

There will be mandatory personal interviews with the instructor scheduled toward the ends of the Fall Term, arranged at instructor/student convenience. Final individual interviews will be scheduled at the end of the Winter Term.

NOTE* Class work is practical in nature and missed classes cannot be regained. It is essential that students take a professional attitude to their work and attend all classes. Without prior notice to the instructor, lateness and/or absence will negatively impact the participation grade. Be prepared to start the class PROMPTLY at 3 pm by arriving a few minutes ahead. Classes involve physical activity and students are required to dress appropriately: loose fitting clothing, soft-soled shoes, no large jewelry, no hats. Cell phones must be turned off during class.
