Course Description	Drama 564, Drama Education is a course that explores through research, studio practice and in situ practice, the nature and function of drama education across a variety of age levels and learning environments. Structuring learning activities, developing classroom environments and controls, empowering students, eliciting experience, fostering aesthetic awareness, assessment strategies, developing strategies to teach drama skills and produce performances are elements of teaching drama that will be explored for those entering the education field or planning to work in camp situations.					
Course Objectives	<ol> <li>The class work and assignments are designed to:         <ol> <li>Provide practical experience in lesson planning and delivery.</li> <li>Develop competencies in classroom management</li> <li>Develop strategies for class design, budgeting, choosing plays and setting a season.</li> <li>Explore assessment strategies.</li> <li>Provide a historical perspective of Drama Education</li> <li>Develop a personal teaching philosophy.</li> <li>Provide opportunity to observe and evaluate forms of drama education.</li> </ol> </li> </ol>					

### Course Activities and Content

The class will be involved in:

- 1. Creating facility and supplies lists
- 2. Developing a Portfolio
- 3. Creating and presenting lesson plans and evaluations/rubrics
- 4. Developing management techniques
- 5. Developing play lists and seasons
- 6. Creating a collective for presentation
- 7. Visitations and personal observations of various drama classes
- 8. Creation of a skills/areas of work list
- 9. Creation of a personal readings list
- 10. Assigned readings, evaluations and presentations of findings as below
- 11. Comparing and evaluating various teaching philosophies and styles, leading to beginning development of a personal teaching philosophy.

#### **READINGS:**

There will be assigned readings throughout the term. These readings will be from various teaching resources and the Alberta Education Drama Course Outlines (available on-line). Students must find a copy of Brian Way's Development through Drama for essential reading.

Fall term: drama for Division III and IV students including improvisation, organization, portfolio development, collective writing and presentation, lesson plan development, teaching methods and seminar development. Research for paper will include school visits.

Winter term: drama for Division III and IV students including working with and directing children, yearly, unit and lesson plan creation, play selection, director's notebook, teaching methods

Drama for Division I and II students will be addressed if so directed by class interests.

There will be no formal examinations.

Marks for the Participation section of the grade will be based on the instructor's observation and assessing the following areas:

- 1. Willingness and commitment to the work.
- 2. Organization and readiness to present.
- 3. Preparation, diligence and development of skills.
- 4. Generosity, respect for and ability to work well with others.
- 5. Successful integration and application of learned skills.
- 6. Ability to listen to suggestions and constructive criticism.

There will be mandatory personal interviews with the instructor scheduled toward the ends of the Fall Term, arranged at instructor/student convenience. Final individual interviews will be scheduled at the end of the Winter Term.

\*\*NOTE\*\*\* Class work is practical in nature and missed classes cannot be regained. It is essential that students take a professional attitude to their work and attend all classes. Without prior notice to the instructor, lateness and/or absence will negatively impact the participation grade. Be prepared to start the class PROMPTLY at noon by arriving a few minutes ahead. Classes involve physical activity and students are required to dress appropriately: loose fitting clothing, soft-soled shoes, no large jewelry, no hats. Students will also be expected to dress appropriately for school visits. Cell phones must be turned off during class.
