Course Description	This class will teach improvisation including character driven improvisation. Using games, exercises, discussion and long form performance, class work will focus on the basics of 'yes and' as well as intentions, tactics, reaction, truth and honesty, listening and honoring one's partner. This class will be one of observation and discussion with an expectation of a high level of participation and risk taking. Attending 2 improvisational performances in Calgary will be included in the class requirements. Students will be responsible for their own ticket purchases, however a
