Course Description	Methods in research in the four areas of specialization in the MFA Theatre Program.			
Course Overview	This course invites graduate performing arts students to examine notions of			
	knowledge and utility in different fields of research and artistic inquiry. A range of			
	empirical and analytical research methods of relevance to the students' research			
	interests will be introduced through readings and case examples. We will discuss and			
	workshop research tools and approaches in the context of the students' research			
	questions in order to build the skill-sets needed to follow these questions through to a			
	complete research design. The overarching objective of this course is for students to			
	appreciate the parameters, procedures, and criteria that different areas of the			
	performing arts adhere to when producing knowledge. In the longer term this			
	foundation will enable students to collaborate across research methods in the			
	performing arts.

Type/description: A written list of min eight sources (books, articles, websites, works, ...) that contextualize the student's research interests. The list should be presented in class with a brief oral introduction to how each source is positioned in relation to the student's research subject.

Assignment 2: Discussion paper or visual chart

Value: 25%

Due Date: October 28 at midnight

Type/description: Written discussion and/or graphical representation of the main differences between two research approaches covered in class. Max 1000 words.

Assignment 3: Project Description

Value: 50%

Due Date: Dec 02 at midnight

Type / description: Written project design including research question(s), contextual project justification, subject material, methodology, plan of study, and bibliography.

Max 1500 words.
