Course description	This course will introduce you to dramaturgical models and tools with a focus on strategies of creation and audience experience. We will work through scriptanalysis and New Play Development of both text-based and physically based work. This course is designed for upper level students with analytical curiosity and a wish to discover how it can be useful in practice.
	Students will be offered mini-lectures, tasked to discuss and report on different cases in groups, and asked to complete supervised analyses and exercises in class. You will also be assigned either academic or practical preparation tasks demanding 5-7 hours of your time per week. Finally, students will apply their artistic skills and dramaturgical tools to the development of a new play or creation project.
Course learning	The learning objectives of this course are to develop:
outcomes	<ol> <li>Dramaturgical awareness of what your mode of looking enables you to work with and how that affects the creation you are engaged in.</li> <li>Ability to shift between and try out different creative approaches with awareness of how each affects the script or performance being developed.</li> <li>Tools to analyze how different approaches "work".</li> <li>Some capacity to arrive at practical strategies for a creative process, compositional choices, and audience experiences.</li> </ol>

	Assignment 3: Written Workshop Reflection, individual An individually prepared 1200-1500-word written reflection on the group workshop process, the student's choice of dramaturgical lenses and approaches, the dramaturgical principles that were adapted or applied through these choices, and the effect these choices had for their contribution to the development.  Value: 30% Due Date: Apr 6, before midnight.
	Extensions of up to 7 days are available for students with a high end of term workload. Please contact your instructor with a request before the Apr 6 deadline.
	Participation Individual level of preparation for and contribution to in-class workshops, discussions, and group work. Particular attention is given to evidence of each student's evolving understanding of dramaturgical principles, awareness of dramaturgical lenses, and ability to apply such principles and awareness to practical tasks and workshops.  Value: 20%
