Assessment components	Assignment 1: "If I Built a Music School": Initial Reflection on the Elementary Music Classroom Assessment Method: In-Class Presentation Description: Students will reflect on how they expect the teaching and learning of music in the elementary classroom to be experienced and present their thoughts in an oral presentation. Weight: 10% Due Date: TBD
	Assignment 2: Instrumental Skill Development Assessment Method: In-Class Presentation Description: Students will demonstrate knowledge of basic ukulele or guitar chords as well as strumming patterns by leading classmates in a song of their choice. In addition, students will identify and explain how their chosen song aligns with the provincial curriculum. Students with previous experience on these instruments are asked to develop their skills on whichever instrument is their weakest. Note: please be mindful of selecting an age-appropriate singing range. Weight: 10% Due Date: TBD
	Assignment 3: Creating and Facilitating Lessons (3) Assessment Method: Group In-Class Presentations Description: Drawing on course content and skills, students create and facilitate 10-15 minute lessons that will be followed by 5 minute debriefing discussions. Students will design play-based lessons that necessitate active engagement in music making. In preceding classes students will devise lesson plans that connect to the curriculum and create a plan for accommodations and assessments. Weight: 20% x 3 Due Date: TBD
	Assignment 4: Active Participation Assessment Method: See "Description" Description: Active engagement in each class is critical for success. Students should approach this course as a semester-long professional development series in which they perceive themselves as teachers and each other as colleagues. In consultation with the instructor at the beginning of the course, students will design a rubric with standards and criteria making clear our collective expectations for what constitutes excellence in participation. Weight: 10% Due Date: TBD
	Assignment 5: Self- and Peer-Assessment Assessment Method: Ongoing observation by the instructor Description: Students will contribute self-assessments of their teaching (Assignment 3) in a medium of their choice (written, oral, audio, video) following criteria devised by the instructor and class. Similarly, students will contribute peer-assessments of classmates' teaching using a medium of their choice.
