<b>Course Description</b>	Directed listening and analysis of jazz forms from the early beginnings of jazz to the present. Styles examined range from Early Jazz to Jazz-Rock Fusion. Major figures considered include: Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Count Basie, Lester Young, Charlie Parker, Miles Davis and John Coltrane.
<b>Course Overview</b>	<p>The goals of MUSI 203-01 are to develop listening skills, familiarization with the main jazz styles, and familiarization with major musical figures in jazz. In developing these aspects, one will come to recognize the following elements among others: swing, improvisation, form in jazz, instruments of jazz, basic procedures of a jazz arrangement, the sound of the major innovators, and what is going on in an improvised jazz solo.</p> <p>It is the student's responsibility to become familiar with the text and listening examples, the basics and origins of jazz, the several jazz styles the text deals with, and the main figures in jazz the text profiles.</p> <p>Class presentations have been designed to augment reading and listening assignments. Use will be made of lectures, in-class listening, video presentations, small group deliberations, Power Points, and ongoing class discussion.</p> <p>In terms of testing, it is the instructor's intention to link the emphases in the textbook to the listening list of recordings so that course emphasis is transparent, to clearly reflect the above emphases in course testing, and to test fairly on concepts, major text/listening list artists and songs, and to make listening test questions only on listening list items.</p>

Recognize various song forms of jazz and understand jazz improvisation. 3. Be knowledgeable about the various styles in the history of jazz. 4.
