Course description	Introduction to the materials of music through development of both aural and written skills.
	Notes: Open to all students. Not available for credit toward BMus. BA (Music) and Music Minor programs. This course serves as preparation for Music 211 .

outcomes	1. Read, name and write key signatures, accidentals, scales, intervals, triads, seventh
	chords, and cadences in four clefs.
	2. Transpose a given melody by a given interval, to a named key, or to or from concert
	pitch for B ^b and F instruments.
	3. Solve triads and dominant or diminished seventh chords, and place them in the context of a key.
	4. Identify the meter when listening to a piece of [Classical] music.
	5. Sing, or recognize when performed, basic materials of music theory rudiments,
	including scales, intervals, triads, seventh chords, and cadences.
	6. Perform (clap) a rhythm from a written score.
	7. Identify and articulate the essential qualities of simple, compound, and hybrid meters and be able to recognize examples of each.
	8. Write notes or rests and notate them properly in a given time signature.
	9. Transcribe an excerpt of music in short score for string quartet or chorus, or vice
	versa.
	10. Identify the key of an excerpt of music and identify the primary harmonies using
	accepted standard notation.
