Course description	Investigation of the fundamental processes of music through analytical and				
	written exercises.				
	This course is the first in a 4-semester sequence in music theory taken by music				
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Course learning	majors at UCalgary. This sequence of courses is designed to help the student musician who intends to make music a career by developing musical skills and an understanding of how music is put together. These courses are called "theory" courses, but they really deal as much with the practice of music as with its theory. The first part of this course will consist of intensive study of fundamentals. Certain portions of this material will probably be familiar to you, but a solid grounding of fundamentals will be very useful to you later on in this and other courses. Other skills we will develop include harmonizing melodies, harmonic analysis, and formal analysis. By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:
