Course description	Part-writing and analysis with an emphasis on diatonic harmony and modulation in		
	the music of the eighteenth century.		
	This course is the second in a 4-semester sequence in music theory taken by most		
	music majors at the UofC. This sequence of courses is designed to help the		

	student musician who intends to make music a career by developing musical skills		
	and an understanding of how music is put together. These courses are called		
	"theory" courses, but they really deal as much with the practice of music as with		
	its theory. This particular course will focus on tonicization and modulation, while		
	continuing to develop skills such as harmonizing melodies, harmonic analysis and		
	formal analysis.
