Course description	Development of skills in rhythm, intonation and sight-singing. Performance of two-
	part contrapuntal exercises with diatonic modulation. This course meets for three hours per week during the Fall and Winter terms.
	This course focuses on aural skills, the training of the ear. Students will strengthen their aural skills through sight singing and notating melodies, chord progressions and rhythms by ear. Students will also develop basic keyboard skills.
