	fluently and is the first of three foundational courses in music history intended for
	B.Mus. and B.A. (Music) students. It is not intended as an "option" course for the
	general university student.
Course description	The course will offer the student a guided study of the music, history, and culture
	of Western Europe between the years (approximately) 900 and 1700 A.D. Central
	to the course will be the musical (listening) selections that will trace the
	development of musical style during these years. The course content will focus
	upon the meaning and artistic substance of such important period style terms as
	the Middle Ages, the Renaissance, and the Baroque, together with a consideration
	of the major composers of each style period. A detailed list of the works to be
	studied (related to the readings from the text) will be provided in the course
	syllabus.
	The course will consist of a series of 3 study "units" each involving readings from
	the text, listening, and questions to be answered based on the readings and
	listening examples contained in the accompanying anthology. The answers (short
	answers and short essays) to these questions will be submitted by E-mail for
	grading. The first two units will include two written assignments and a listening
	test, and the third (slightly long unit) will contain three assignments plus a listening
	test—ten graded items in all. (See details below.)
