Course description	This course is intended for the first year B. Mus./B.A. Music Major student and provides a survey of the major composers and repertory of Western art music from about 1600 to about 1750. Emphasis will be placed upon a listening knowledge of a representative sample of the music of this historical period. The classes will present a survey of the major stylistic developments during the period, analysis of selected works, and a discussion of important composers and their compositions—all in a broader context of the history and culture of the period under study. A detailed syllabus of weekly lectures, readings, and listening assignments will be provided.			
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will: 1. Have a listening knowledge of major works by the composers studied. 2. Have written an historical essay on Baroque-period music. 3. Have a knowledge of the social and political history of Europe from 1600 to 1750. 4. Have the ability to analyse Baroque music 5. Have a knowledge of the major changes in musical style between 1600 and 1750.
