Criteria That Must Be Met To Pass

Assignments must demonstrate a sincere and imaginative engagement with the objectives and challenges of the creative or research exercise.

Expectations for Writing:

Writing skills are important to academic study across all disciplines. Consequently, instructors may use their assessment of writing quality as a factor in the evaluation of student work. Please refer to the Undergraduate Calendar E.2 Writing Across the Curriculum policy for details.

Guidelines for Formatting Assignments

Written assignments should include 1) a title page and appropriate footnotes and a bibliography/list of references. The text should be double-spaced. Follow MLA guidelines for formatting the main text and a standard format for the bibliography (eg. MLA, APA, Chicago)

Audio and software assignments should be formatted and prepared according to the specific instructions of the exercise.

Late Assignments

The grade for assignments submitted more than one week late will be reduced by 2% per day.
