Prerequisites	None
Course description	Selected topics examining popular music from a critical perspective. Examines the meaning and messages of popular music and its impact on present-day culture.
	Topics may include the examination of the work of specific creators or performers,
	the recording industry, the impact of specific instruments (e.g. guitar, percussion,
	electronic media, etc.), or cross-cultural influences. Attendance at relevant musical
	concerts and lectures may be required.
	A continuation of MUSI 306: The Rise of Rock, 1950-1977, this course examines
	popular musics of the late 1970s, starting with punk, up until the present time. In
	particular, this course will examine the rise of rap and hip-hop culture through the
	1980s, 1990s, 2000s, and its gradual takeover of rock music as the best-selling
	genre/style worldwide.
	Note: This course is NOT the history of punk music.

Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: <ol> <li>analyze popular music media</li> <li>discuss key topics in popular music history and explain the phenomena of cultural contexts in which popular musics are made</li> <li>analyze popular music as a socio-cultural construction using various models of analysis presented throughout the course</li> </ol>
	develop critical thinking and writing skills
Course schedule	Test 1 – July 13; Test 2 – July 27; Test 3 – August 10
Assessment components	Multiple Choice Tests Value: 20% each x 3 (60% total) Type: At-home test Dates: Test 1 – July 13; Test 2 – July 27; Test 3 – August 10 Description: These computer-based tests are comprised of multiple-choice questions. Students are given a 24-hour window to access a test, and 3 hours to complete a test. Note that these tests are designed to take no longer than 2 hours. A typical test contains 40 questions. Test 1 covers Lectures 1-4; Test 2 covers Lectures 5-7; Test 3 covers Lectures 8-10.
	Media and Press Reviews Value: 20% each x 2 (40% total) Due Date: Assignment 1 – July 16; Assignment 2 – August 6 Description: These two written assessments invite engagement with music journalism/criticism, including: (1) interviews/podcasts of contemporary artists, and (2) reviewing new music releases.
	Following instructor-provided guidelines and criteria, students will select their own artists to profile in the aforementioned media. Review papers should be approximately 1000 words in length.
Assessment expectations	Guidelines for Submitting Assignments: All assignments can be submitted via Dropbox. Please do not email assignments to the instructor or TA.
	<ul> <li>Missed or Late Assignments:</li> <li>Late assignments *may* be graded at the discretion of the TA. The simple reality is that we have 6-7 weeks to complete the course. The assignments and tests are spread out such to establish a feasible pace of completing the course requirements. We will do our best to accommodate students who are unable to make deadlines due to circumstances beyond their control.</li> <li>Related to the above point, please take note of the University's regulation M.1:</li> <li>Students may be asked to provide supporting documentation for an exemption/special request. This may include, but is not limited to, a prolonged absence from a course where participation is required, a missed course assessment, a deferred examination, or an appeal. Students are encouraged to submit documentation that will support their situation. Supporting documentation may be dependent on the reason noted in their personal statement/explanation provided to explain their situation.
