Course description	This course is intended for the undergraduate university student not majoring in music. The focus of the course is upon the music, history, and culture of Vienna between 1780 and 1914—the period from "First Viennese School" (F. J. Haydn, W.A. Mozart, Ludwig van Beethoven, and Franz Schubert) to the end of Viennese Romanticism and the music of Johann Strauss II, Johannes Brahms, Gustav Mahler, and Franz Léhar. Selected works by these and other major figures in musical Vienna will be studied both as musical art works and as a component in Viennese history and culture. The course will contrast musical works of "high culture" (symphonies, string quartets, piano sonatas) with works of "middle-class culture" (comic opera and operetta). A detailed syllabus of weekly lectures, readings, and listening assignments will be provided.
Course learning	By the completion of this course, successful students will:

Course schedule	A detailed syllabus by week and class will be distributed to students separately. On Tuesdays, following the weekly Zoom meeting, students will be sent an E-mail with the assignment to be completed according to the schedule given below. Students will have one week to complete assignments, but because there are seven assignments across thirteen weeks, these assignments will include small break periods to concentrate on the reading and listening. Assignments will be due on Tuesdays; the listening tests will also be on Tuesdays. On weeks before a listening test, there will be no assignment—the work for the week consisting of preparation for the listening test. The listening tests are non-cumulative.
