Course Description and Objectives	This course is an introduction to the sensuous and structural elements of music. Through lectures, discussions, and guided listening to recordings and in-class performances, students will acquire a vocabulary that will enable them to listen more deeply to the expressive qualities of music and to gain an understanding of how music, as an art form, is constructed. Topics will include melody, harmony, texture, rhythm, orchestration and form. Students will listen to music from a variety of cultures and genres. In addition, students will encounter some of the recent research on music listening coming from a variety of disciplines.
Course Activities	Class meetings will consist of extensive listening, discussion, and analysis of music drawn from many genres, historical periods, and places of origin.

#### **Assignments**

#### **Listening Tests**

The instructor will provide students with a required listening list via Desire2Learn one week prior to each test. These tests will also, as the course goes on, include analytical listening tasks that focus on topics covered in the course.

#### Midterm Test

The midterm will comprise a listening test with a required listening list; an analytical listening test focusing on metre, mode, and cadences; the stylistic identification of a mystery piece; and a short-answer quiz on musical vocabulary.

### **Concert Reports**

Students are required to attend three concerts and provide the instructor with the printed program and a one-page (12 pt Times, 1.5 space) report, half of which is devoted to a "musical" description and the other half to a "creative" description of <u>one piece on the program</u>.

The "musical" description should employ concepts learned in class to discuss what you experienced in the concert. It is important that this section <u>not</u> become too emotional ("I liked the third song"), emphasizing instead concrete facts and musical terminology ("The third song featured driving compound rhythms and energized syncopation.").

The "creative" description is the place for an emotional response to the piece of music you heard. In the past, students have written short stories or poems, painted a picture, taken a photograph, or written music of their own for this short creative response

Students will attend two of the concerts chosen from the list of events presented by the Department of Music and one concert from any other organization, provided that the venue is one that promotes listening (bars, nightclubs, and coffee shops are usually not acceptable).

The concerts sponsored by the Department of Music are free to University of Calgary students. Fifteen minutes prior to the concert, present a student ID to the ticket office.

Unless noted, all concerts take place in the Eckhardt-Gramatée Hall in the Rosza Centre and begin at 8:00 pm.
