Course Description	An introduction to the sensuous and structural elements of music, leading to a greater
	appreciation for the art of music in a global multi-cultural context.

Course Overview	This course is an introduction to the sensuous and structural elements of music.
	Through lectures, discussions, and guided listening to recordings and in-class
	performances, students will acquire a vocabulary that will enable them to listen more
	deeply to the expressive qualities of music and to gain an understanding of how music,
	as an art form, is constructed. Topics will include melody, harmony, texture, rhythm,
	orchestration and form. Students will listen to music from a variety of cultures and
	genres. In addition, students will encounter some of the recent research on music
	listening coming from a variety of disciplines.

Description: At the beginning of the course, students will listen to several unidentified works and write about them. Students will revisit these write-ups at the end of the

course and evaluate their personal improvement.
