Course description	The course will offer the student a guided study of the music, history, and culture of Western Europe between the years (approximately) 1700 A.D. to 1900 A.D. Central to the course will be the musical (listening) selections that will trace the development of musical style during these years. The course content will focus
	upon the meaning and artistic substance of such important period style terms as the Late Baroque, Classical, and Romantic, together with a consideration of the major composers of each style period. A detailed list of the works to be studied (related to the readings from the text) will be provided in the course syllabus.
	The course will consist of a series of 3 study "units" each concluding with a test or final examination and involving readings from the text, listening, and assignments. (See details below.)

	2. Have a knowledge of the basic facts of Western European history during the same period.
	3. Understand the basic principles of composition that inform Western musical culture from 1700 A.D. to 1900 A.D.
	4. Have a listening knowledge of Late Baroque, Classical, and Romantic musical
