Course description	Investigations into hierarchical relations in music. Study of how various levels of musical structure relate in order to form a whole.
	The objective of this course is to gain an understanding of formal practices in art
	music. The focus for much of the semester will be on classical form, from individual ideas, phrases, and themes to the large-scale organization of complete movements. We will emphasize the notion of <i>formal function</i> , that is, the specific role a given formal unit plays in the structural organization of a classical work. Time permitting, we will then turn to music of other time periods and the ways in which the formal organizations that we see in classical-period music change and develop over the centuries.
