Learning Technologies and Requirements for this ONLINE course

There is a D2L site for this course which contains required readings and other relevant class resources and materials (see d2L.ucalgary.ca).

In order to successfully engage in their learning experiences at the University of Calgary, students taking online, remote and blended courses are required to have reliable access to the following technology:

- A computer with a supported operating system, as well as the latest security, and malware updates;
- A current and updated web browser;
- Webcam (built-in or external);
- Microphone and speaker (built-in or external) or headset with microphone;

Most current laptops will have a built-in webcam, speaker and microphone.

If they have not already done so, students must invest a music notation software. There are many inexpensive programs available. However, make sure that the program enables the user to generate fully professional scores and parts. Noteability Pro, a powerful and free program for mac OS, is available at debussy.music.ubc.ca/download.html

Description

Advanced creative work with an emphasis upon either chamber music composition or studio composition.

Outcomes

The course will focus upon the creative application of compositional craft. In addition to some introductory etudes, students will complete two compositions described below in which they demonstrate their ability to develop their musical materials in a coherent and dramatically convincing manner over an extended duration. Students will also develop a vocabulary for constructive critique of the work of their colleagues.

The completed compositions will be for the following forces:

- 1. Large scale work: piano trio (violin, violoncello, piano) maximum duration of five minutes.
- 2. Short work: A trio for a homogenous ensemble of single line orchestral instruments or three voices without use of a text (for example, SSA vocalize, three saxophones (SAT or ATBar), three clarinets (2 Bb and bass or 3 Bb), three trumpets, string trio, etc. A percussion trio must include only keyboard percussion instruments. (minimum 3 minutes, maximum five minutes)

The piano trio (score and parts) will be completed by November 17 in time for a workshop on December 1 that will be a reading session with the members of the Lands End Ensemble. This workshop will require all of the social distancing requirements necessary for the safety of everyone involved. The Ensemble will then select some of the pieces from this session to include in a public performance, tentatively scheduled for the Alchemy series in April.

- November 6 (on or before 16:00): Completed score submitted to D2L Dropbox
- November 10: Completed score returned to students with instructor suggestions for corrections and/or slight revisions
- November 17 (on or before 16:00): Corrected score submitted to D2L Drop box

Note: No piece that is not notated to the standards of the profession will be submitted to the LE ensemble.

The short work (score) will be submitted on December 9 (on or before 16:00), via the D2L Dropbox.

Activities

The course will begin with introductory work on a three-stage creative process: idea generation, idea exploration, longitudinal realization. The focus of this work will be on harmonic and polyphonic procedures. Then, students will present work-in-progress for critique by their colleagues and the instructor. Discussions will also focus upon creative strategies and specific compositional issues relating to craft.

There is no final examination for this course.

Students must satisfactorily (C- or better) complete every subsection of the above in order to pass the course as a whole. All creative work will be submitted as computer-notated scores that meet the standards of the profession.

Work-in-progress will be presented to the class via the share-screen function on Zoom. This work must be clearly notated, using a computer notation software program that also allows for the presentation of sound files of the materials.

Guidelines for Zoom Sessions

Zoom is a video conferencing program that will allow us to meet at specific times for a "live" video conference, so that we can have the opportunity to meet each other virtually and discuss relevant course topics as a learning community.

To help ensure Zoom sessions are private, do not share the Zoom link or password with others, or on any social media platforms. Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course. Zoom recordings and materials presented in Zoom, including any teaching materials, must not be shared, distributed or published without the instructor's permission.
