Course description	An applied and conceptual study of current practices in combining sound and image. Historical and contemporary practices of audiovisual art, video music, vidéomusique, as well as interactive performance and installation works that employ sound and image will be studied. Emphasis will be placed on creating and designing audiovisual performances and fixed works employing audiovisual sensors for media capture in conjunction with control and interactivity in MaxMSPJitter, Processing, and Pd as well as creating fixed works with Final Cut Pro.

- 2) Materials for compositional etudes (audio, software, sequencer files, etc.) must be tested and ready for presentation on the date due. Materials must be submitted to the instructor upon completion of the presentation of the etude in class.

#### Criteria That Must Be Met To Pass

Assignments must demonstrate a sincere and imaginative engagement with the objectives and challenges of the compositional or research exercise, a high audiovisual quality presentation of etudes, and a knowledgeable presentation of the etude or research required.

#### **Expectations for Writing:**

Writing skills are important to academic study across all disciplines. Consequently, instructors may use their assessment of writing quality as a factor in the evaluation of student work. Please refer to the Undergraduate Calendar E.2 Writing Across the Curriculum policy for details.

**Guidelines for Formatting Assignments** 

All written and audiovisual work to be submitted must be either 1) sent to the instructor via a file transfer service (WeTransfer, etc.) 2) submitted to the instructor on an easily read physical medium (CD/DVD-R, flashdrive, etc.) or 3) clearly labeled and uploaded to the desktop of the class studio computer.

#### **Late Assignments**

The grade for assignments submitted more than one week late will be reduced by 2% per day.
