Course description	An applied and conceptual study of current practices in combining sound and image. Historical and contemporary practices of audiovisual art, video music, vidéomusique, as well as interactive performance and installation works that employ sound and image will be studied. Emphasis will be placed on creating and designing audiovisual performances and fixed works employing audiovisual sensors for media capture in conjunction with control and interactivity in MaxMSPJitter, Processing, and Pd as well as creating fixed works with Final Cut Pro.
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: 1. Employ terminology and concepts in the apprehension and discussion of audiovisual art practices 2. Employ current technologies for the control of audiovisual authoring and design 3. Employ current technologies for the creation and performance of audiovisual art projects 4. Be familiar with current research and creative activities that employ advanced audiovisual technologies and skills 5. Be familiar with the history of audiovisual art practices and their relationship with other art forms
Course schedule	Participation includes weekly progress on class presentations and audiovisual etudes, and active involvement in class discussions and demonstrations. SCPA Claim Your Seat Program: Student Guidelines	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The Claim Your Seat (CYS) program allows all University of Calgary students to attend on-campus School of Creative and Performing Arts (Dance, Drama and Music) events free of charge. 2. Depending on the performance, there is a limited number of seats available for CYS. There is not a guarantee that tickets will be available for all CYS patrons for every performance, based on audience size, demand, etc. 3. CYS tickets are a privilege. If a student receives a ticket to attend a performance, it is expected that they will respect the value of the admission and attend the performance. 4. Process for students: On the date of the performance, from the time the Box Office opens until 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, students should find the UTS staff member with an iPad and show their UCID card to print their CYS ticket. If students arrive after 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, they can also go to the Box Office and purchase a ticket at the student rate. Students should not go to the Box Office unless they are purchasing a ticket. 5. they can find a UTS staff member with an iPad and get their CYS ticket from them. 6. If students have a course requirement to attend a performance for a specific date, access to the tickets will be communicated by the instructor to University Theatre Services prior to the event. The best guarantee for a free ticket is to arrive early, up to 45 minutes prior to the performance start time.
