### Polyphony in Late 20th- and Early 21st- Century Music

#### **Course Description**

Through selected readings, analysis, seminar presentations and discussions, students will investigate polyphony, with a special emphasis upon selected compositions from the late 20<sup>th</sup> and early 21<sup>st</sup> century. Beginning with a review of fundamental voice leading and polyphonic concepts (independence, multiplicity, polychronicity, imitation), their scientific foundations and the intellectual controversies they have generated, the course will proceed to an investigation of the means through which contemporary composers have generated new approaches to polyphony, creating new intellectual challenges for musicians and listeners.

#### **Learning Outcomes**

By the completion of the course, successful students will acquire the skills necessary to investigate, describe and critique contemporary polyphonic music from humanistic, scientific, and, above all, artistic perspectives. Students will be able to analyze and discuss contemporary music that incorporates complex polyphonic thinking: new approaches to imitation; web/net textures; micro-polyphony; serial techniques; controlled aleatory; multi-textural polyphony (sound mass); spectral techniques; biophony; audio/radio polyphony; antiphony; and some electroacoustic concepts like multiple-speaker dissemination.

Because the course is a seminar, respectful dialogue is of paramount importance. This comprises listening carefully, thinking deeply about the issues under investigation, framing insightful questions, presenting and defending an artistic/intellectual discovery, providing apposite responses to colleagues' work, and changing one's mind.

#### **Prerequisites**

One 400-level Music and Composition course or permission of the instructor. Students will be expected to be know all of the concepts normally found in an undergraduate post-tonal theory course (UC MUSI 313) and to have studied representative masterpieces of European polyphonic music, from its inception to the early modern period.

#### Assessment

There is no final examination in this course.

Class engagement will be assessed according to the degree to which the student has satisfied the requirements of the second paragraph of **Learning Outcomes**, above. 50% of this component will be assessed by the instructor and 50% will be assessed by colleagues.

The remaining components of the course will be assessed according to the following criteria: clarity, accuracy, and degree of artistic/intellectual insight.

The **précis** will be one-page digests of the assigned readings, containing summaries of what the student has understood to be the salient points and some element of critique. These will be presented orally (2 minutes maximum) at the beginning of each Monday class, stating January 21. The written document will be submitted to the instructor at the same time.

The **presentations** will consist of 20-minute oral presentations on an approved topic relating to the theme of the course, normally an analysis of a selected work (or excerpt of a large scale-work) focusing upon the its polyphonic features. Students will provide copies of their annotated music examples, diagrams or figures and a bibliography to their colleagues and the instructor at the beginning of their presentations. For one presentation only, composition students may substitute a composition that features a creative approach to polyphonic procedures discussed in class. This composition must not be or have been created for any other class. This option must be discussed in advance with the instructor.

The **term paper** will be a five-page (c 2000 word) examination of an approved topic, normally an analysis of a selected contemporary composition or an intellectual (humanistic or scientific) discussion of a polyphonic issue relating to contemporary music. Musical examples, diagrams, figures and the bibliography will be appendices to the main document and will not count toward the pages or the word-count.

Writing skills are important to academic study across all disciplines. Consequently, instructors may use their assessment of writing quality as a factor in the evaluation of student work. Please refer to the Undergraduate Calendar E.2 Writing Across the Curriculum policy for details.
