Creative and analytical approaches to the study of sound-based music encompassing acousmatic, interactive, acoustic and soundscape works. The course will also draw upon research into acoustic ecology and the perception of timbre, and introduce current audio analysis software.

Through listening, score-reading, discussion, analysis, aural score creation, written work and creative etudes, students will develop a deeper understanding of sound-based music, techniques and aesthetics along with relevant analytical techniques. In consultation with the instructor, students will also present one of their own compositions or a work by a composer or sonic artist that interests them.
