expectations	Assessment Method: A rubric will be provided to the students outlining the
expectations	expectations.
	Description: Three options for this assignment:
	~~~Memorizing a solo by listening to a recording and committing it to memory through
	repetition. Capture the nuances of phrasing, rhythm, inflections and tone.
	~~~Writing down/transcribing a solo from a recording and memorizing it. Again with nuances of phrasing, rhythm, inflections and tone.
	~~~Using a transcribed solo from a book, listen to the recording many times. Then sing
	along with the solo, then play it gradually bringing it up to speed. Memorize it for best
	results.

	Make a recording of your transcription. Please submit it to Jeremy as an mp3 file, clearly labeled with your name and what it is, eg. Your Name, composition title. Please announce what you are playing verbally as well before you play.
	You MUST submit a notated music portion to this assignment, and the mode depends on what of the three transcription methods you choose: 1. A lead sheet with the chords and melody to your transcription (everyone, 2. the written transcription you

	write out yourself, or, a minimum of one chorus of the solo you learn by ear, or, a copy of the already written out transcription by someone else you learn. <b>Do not</b> <b>underestimate the effort needed to learn the solo thoroughly. It is not an easy task</b> <b>and assessment will be rigorous, the results though, are considerable.</b> Submit: April 9 2021. Weight: 20%
	<u>Contrafact</u> Choose a jazz standard and compose an original melody over it. Write it out, record it with a backing track and submit by April 9 2021.
	Assessment Method: A rubric will be used and made available to students. It will assess accuracy of chords and melody played, fluency, feel, use of riffs and licks and inflections, note accuracy, intonation and tone.
	Please submit it to Jeremy as an mp3 file, clearly labeled with your name and what it is, eg. Your Name, composition title. Please announce what you are playing verbally as well before you play.
	Weight: 20%
	Attendance: With regard to participation, classes are considered equivalent to assignments. (see below) Thus, more than <u>2</u> absences per term will have an adverse effect on your final grade. If you miss more than 4 classes, you have the potential to fail the course. If you show up late for or leave early from class, this will be counted as half an absence.
	Weekly quizzes will be given and include tunes, licks, riffs, scales, chords and digital patterns among other techniques. The on-line resources below are helpful in practice to prepare for classes. Students will record two jazz standards for submission that utilize licks, riffs, scales, chords and digital patterns studied in class. Make a recording of your transcription. Please submit it to Jeremy as an mp3 file, clearly labeled with your name and what it is, eg. Your Name, tune titles. Please announce what you are playing verbally as well before you play. Due April 9 2021.
