Course description	This course is intended for the third or fourth year B. Mus./B.A. Music Major student. It provides a survey of the major Romantic European opera composers and operatic repertory from 1800 to about 1900. Emphasis will be placed upon a listening knowledge of a representative sample of the music of this historical period. The classes will present a survey of the major stylistic developments of opera during the period, in the context of an analysis of selections from different repertory works—all in a broader context of the history and culture of the period under study. A detailed syllabus of weekly lectures, readings, and listening assignments will be provided.			
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will: 1. Have a listening knowledge of major works by the composers studied. 2. Have written an analytical essays on topics in Romantic opera. 3. Have a knowledge of the social and political history of Europe from 1800-1900. 4. Have the ability to analyse Romantic operas.
