Course description	This course is intended for the third or fourth year music major. The course will cover the music and culture of Vienna between 1870 and 1914 to the purpose of examining the collapse of Romanticism and the birth of modernism as aesthetic concepts. In terms of music, this task will be accomplished through the close study of representative works by Brahms, Bruckner, Johann Strauss II, Mahler, Hugo Wolf, Richard Strauss, Schoenberg, and Berg. In terms of the wider culture, the course will consider the art of the Viennese Seccession (Klimt and others), as well as literature (Arthur Schnitzler, Hugo von Hoffmanstahl).		
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will: 1. Have a listening knowledge of major works by the composers studied. 2. Have written historical and analytical essays on Viennese music and culture. 3. Have a knowledge of the social and political history of Vienna from 1870-1914. 4. Have the ability to analyse late-Romantic and early modern music. 5. Have a knowledge of the major changes in musical style between 1870 and 2014.
