Course description	A study of the music of Chopin and Liszt, focusing upon selected major works, considered in their social and political context, and with an emphasis upon musical analysis—all in light of modern academic studies of the music of these two composers. The underlying goal of the course is to provide the student with in-depth instruction on the music of these composers that involves engaged classroom discussion prepared by appropriate readings, musical works studied, and perspectives in musical analysis based upon modern studies.
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will: 1. Have a listening knowledge of major works by Chopin and Liszt 2. Have written essays on the music of Chopin and Liszt 3. Have a knowledge of the social and political history of Europe from 1800-1850 4. Have the ability to analyse the music of Chopin and Liszt

Assessment components	Midterm Test (Chopin): 22 October—35% Term Paper 1 (On Chopin) 31 October—15% Term Paper 2 (On Liszt) 7 December—15% Final Examination (Liszt) (Scheduled by the Registrar)—35%

The Claim Your Seat (CYS) program allows all University of Calgary students to attend on-campus School of Creative and Performing Arts (Dance, Drama and Music) events free of charge. 2. Depending on the performance, there is a limited number of seats available for CYS. There is not a guarantee that tickets will be available for all CYS patrons for every performance, based on audience size, demand, etc. 3. CYS tickets are a privilege. If a student receives a ticket to attend a performance, it is expected that they will respect the value of the admission and attend the performance. 4. Process for students: On the date of the performance, from the time the Box Office opens until 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, students should find the UTS staff member with an iPad and show their UCID card to print their CYS ticket. If students arrive after 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, they can also go to the Box Office and purchase a ticket at the student rate. Students should not go to the Box Office unless they are purchasing a ticket. 5. If students have a course requirement to attend a performance for a specific date, access to the tickets will be communicated by the instructor to University Theatre Services prior to the event. The best guarantee for a free ticket is to arrive early,
