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Course Description

The study of the varied interactions between humans and other animals offers an alternative, environmental way to understand China's civilization and culture. From the onset, animals have worked with humans in the making of China's agrarian civilization, as well as in times of war. Animals figure prominently in the written system itself and in the traditional worldview. There will also be a focus on particular species that define China's cultural specificities.

Objectives of the Course

Through the study of working, companion, and commodity animals, the student will get insights into Chinese civilization that are historically based and informed by material culture.

The study of the animal as a figure in writing, art and classification will further contribute to the understanding of China's traditional worldview.

Required Readings

All required readings are contained in the "CHIN317.01 W2012" course pack, which is for sale at the bookstore of the University of Calgary.

Assignments and Evaluation

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5 quizzes: 40% (5 quizzes x 8%);
2 reports: 40% (1<sup>st</sup> =15%; 2<sup>nd</sup> = 25%);
1 final exam: 20% (5 questions x 4%).
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The <u>five</u> quizzes are multiple choice and/or answers in a few words on material discussed in class up to the quiz.

The <u>two</u> reports are brief (600-word) essays on *one*_topic of your choice. It can focus on one animal; or on one issue or field. The second report is based on the first one and is more of an in-depth study.
