DESCRIPTION

This course will prepare students with prior knowledge of French for first-year French courses by providing a thorough grammar review at the intermediate level and extensive practice in listening comprehension, oral and written production, and reading comprehension.

OBJECTIVES

Students will develop intermediate skills in 5 competencies: listening and reading comprehensions, speaking, interacting, and writing productions. In addition, they will acquire intermediate knowledge of French vocabulary, grammar, and Francophone cultures through texts studied in class and in the lab.

OUTCOMES

Students will reach intermediate-level proficiency in French and will be able to improve their linguistic and cultural skills in French.

PREREQUISITES

FREN 211, French 30 or equivalent, or consent of the Department. Students with credit in any course beyond the equivalent of French 30 must register in FREN 225 or FREN 227. The minimum prerequisite grade for entry into a language course is C- or better in the preceding course.

COURSE NOTES

1. Students are expected to check the D2L page (d2l.ucalgary.ca) daily for announcements, homework, assignments, marks, and tentative schedule.
2. **Regular attendance is essential for success** in any language class. The instructor should be informed of any reason for prolonged absence.

5. Lab will commence on the week of **Monday January 17th, 2022**. Attendance is mandatory. An oral presentation will be required as an element of the laboratory work. The presentation will be done with a partner, but individual marks will be given for grammar, vocabulary, flow and pronunciation, content, creativity, and overall effort. **NO READING ALLOWED**. The topics of the oral presentations and the grading rubrics will be posted on D2L.
6. Students are encouraged to meet the French Centre monitors regularly, namely, to complete their French Passport activities. Monitors are available Monday to Friday, from 9.00 AM to 3.00 PM.
7. **Permission** should be obtained from the instructor before any lecture recording.

Notes:

- There is **no final exam**, but all tests are cumulative.
- The **two dictations** are closed book and will take place in class on the scheduled dates.
- The **two tests** will be open book and completed on D2L at home, during class hours. A grace period of 10 minutes will be provided to account for potential issues with technology.
- The **two compositions** will be open book and submitted in D2L Dropbox. Students will have 24 hours to complete Composition 1 and 50 minutes (+ 10-minute grace period) to complete Composition 2, during class hours. **Late submissions will not be accepted.**
- All assessments are to be done individually by the students. Students are advised to read the excerpt on plagiarism and academic misconduct.
- Missed tests, dictations, or compositions without a valid reason will be awarded a grade of zero. **There are no make-up exams.**

- 1) Dictations** are spelling tests. Your instructor prepares a paragraph and reads it to you slowly so you can write every word and punctuation. There is no memorization necessary and there are no questions to answer at the end of the test. Dictations are designed to verify your understanding of sounds, words, phrases, grammar, and syntax. When grading dictations, one mark is taken away for each of the following: spelling, verb agreement, adjective agreement, noun agreement, capital letters, accents, punctuation, and all omissions. Dictations are approximately 100 words long. To prepare for dictations, follow your instructor's advice on the pages to review in the textbook, read chapter vocabulary aloud paying attention to accents and liaisons, spell each new noun with its article, and write down each verb with its conjugation. Each dictation is worth 5%.
- 2) Compositions** are a paragraph written on a specific topic given by your instructor. They can vary in length: 150-200 words in FREN 213. Compositions are marked out of 10 points and are graded for content (respect of the given topic, appropriate length, creativity, avoidance of repetition, use of vocabulary seen in class) and for proper language use (varied vocabulary, conjugations, punctuation, agreements, sentence structure, spelling, prepositions, and avoidance of anglicisms). The grading rubric will be discussed in class. Each composition is worth 10%.
- 3) Oral presentation (in Lab)** is designed to give you a chance to practice French orally. Topics are posted on D2L with the marking rubrics (content, grammar, syntax, varied vocabulary, pronunciation (including prosody, accentuation, rhythm, and liaisons), speech delivery, props, creativity, and effort). Your oral presentation will take place in the lab. You will do your oral presentation with a partner, but individual marks will be granted. No reading is allowed. Only index cards with key words may be used. A penalty of -25% will apply to all oral presentations read to the audience. The oral presentation is worth 10%.
- 4) Tests** are based on unit material and are divided into three sections. They will include listening comprehension, reading comprehension, and grammar/vocabulary questions. Each section is presented with detailed instructions, as well as the mark value and the weight. Before each test, your instructor will discuss the format of the test and provide review. Each test is worth 20% of the final mark.
- 5) Active participation** in lab and class is worth 10% of your final mark. Attendance is crucial. You need to come prepared for class and lab.

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6) Passport activities

- Students will have to complete **4** communicative activities in the French Centre, Monday-Friday (Craigie Hall C 301)
- 4 activities x 2,5% each = 10% of your final mark.
- You may do these activities in any order.
- **One** activity per visit, **One** activity per week. **Plan accordingly.**
- All activities are to be completed by **Friday April 8th, 2022**
