DESCRIPTION DU COURS : Améliorer ses capacités de communication à l'écrit et à l'oral, en respectant les conventions de genre (type de texte et d'interaction) et de registre (langue familière, standard, soutenue). Apprendre à mieux lire et rédiger différents types de textes écrits. Approfondir ses connaissances grammaticales et lexicales.

OBJECTIFS : A la fin du cours, les étudiants auront revu en profondeur plusieurs points de grammaire (articles, démonstratifs, adjectifs, adverbes, pronoms personnels, présent de l'indicatif et de l'impératif). Ils seront capables de décrire et de comparer des personnes et des lieux, ainsi que d'exprimer la cause et la conséquence. Ils auront acquis le vocabulaire nécessaire pour comprendre et de rédiger des textes en français soigné.

REMARQUES AU SUJET DU COURS :

1. L'apprentissage d'une langue étant un phénomène vivant, la présence active de l'étudiant(e) en classe et aux travaux pratiques est considérée indispensable. Il faudrait prévoir un minimum de 2 heures de travail à la maison pour chaque heure de cours. Les travaux pratiques commencent la DEUXIÈME semaine des cours.
2. Les étudiant(e)s sont priés de consulter régulièrement le site <http://blackboard.ucalgary.ca> pour information sur les travaux à rendre, les questionnaires, les exercices supplémentaires, l'horaire et les notes.
3. Les travaux non complétés à temps, les tests et examens non écrits aux jours prévus sans raison valable, recevront un F. Il n'y aura pas de travaux de rattrapage.

4. Il n'y a pas d'examen de mi-session. Tous les tests sont cumulatifs.
5. Chaque étudiant devra compléter un mini-questionnaire qui sera affiché sur Blackboard selon le schéma suivant : Intro à St Exupéry et à l'Aéropostale (Quiz 1), chapitres 1 à 3 (Quiz 2), chapitres 4 et 5 (Quiz 3) , chapitres 6 et 7 (Quiz 4), chapitres 8 et 9 (Quiz 5), chapitres 10 et 11(Quiz 6), chapitres 12 et 13 (Quiz 7), chapitres 14 et 15 (Quiz 8), chapitres 16 à 19 (Quiz 9), chapitres 20 à 23 (Quiz 10).
6. Une brève présentation orale sera faite en classe par chaque étudiant au sujet d'un chapitre de *Vol de nuit*.
7. La boîte aux documents du département, située dans le hall d'entrée du troisième étage de Craigie Hall, entre les blocs D et C, est mise à la disposition des étudiants pour y déposer les devoirs et travaux requis pour leurs cours. Le matériel placé dans la boîte sera ramassé en début et en fin de journée (jours ouvrables) et sera timbré à la date de ce jour.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
 - a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
 - b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
 - c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
 - d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.

DISABILITIES AND ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATION

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations.
