DESCRIPTION : Analyse de divers textes et documents du XVII^e siècle se rapportant à la représentation de la femme. Nous verrons, entre autres, des articles de dictionnaires, des cartes allégoriques, des poèmes, des pièces de théâtre et des récits en prose.

Objectives : À la fin du cours, les étudiantes comprendront mieux la représentation de la femme dans la littérature du XVII^e siècle. Elles sauront distinguer entre les divers mouvements d'inspiration féminine. Elles auront vu les termes précieuse, coquette, femme galante, femme savante et honnête femme et comprendront leur portée dans le contexte de l'époque. Elles auront acquis des notions théoriques sur l'utopie et l'analyse narrative et auront approfondi leur compétence en analyse littéraire.

Prerequisites : Trois demi-cours de français de niveau 400 ou autorisation du Département.

The official grading system (A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1) will be applied for the calculation of all components of the course and the final mark.

Students are recommended to consult the University's explanation of the Grading System, <http://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/f-2.html> which clearly states that B is awarded for "above average performance" and that a mark of A is reserved for "superior performance".

Active participation is defined as being consistently well prepared for class and contributing to class discussions on a regular basis. In particular participation in the discussion of other students' in class presentations will be considered and each student will be responsible for chairing the presentation of one other student.

Marks of B+ or higher in the dissertation or presentation will require increasing degrees of sophistication and originality in the treatment of the topic. While grammar per se is not an explicit criterion, it does impact overall clarity and coherence and written and oral production will be evaluated in this perspective.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.

DISABILITIES AND ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATION

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations. Students with a documented disability who may require academic accommodation and have not registered with the Student Accessibility Services should contact their office at 220-8237.
