COURSE DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVES

This course seeks to broadly introduce students to major forms of popular culture in Japan from the 20th and 21st centuries: namely, manga (print comics) and anime (animation), and their related subcultures, modern Japanese literature, works of Japanese cinema, and contemporary videogames. The goal of this course is to sufficiently acquaint students with these media and introduce basic methods for analysis so that they may later continue their studies and take standalone course offerings in each of these areas (e.g., JPNS 317.02, 323, 325, 327, 423). As this is a 200-level junior course, assignments will focus on developing core skills (close reading, essay writing, presenting research) needed for humanities study and success in one's university career, as well as one's personal and professional life, more broadly.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the course students will be able to:

- Identify and evaluate the thesis and main argument of an academic article through close reading
- Write their own original thesis statement and intro paragraph for an academic essay on a text
- Synthesize and present orally their own original research on an aspect of Japanese popular culture
- Apprehend the history and evolution of Japanese pop culture and possess the tools to analyze it

COURSE NOTES

- This class will be a <u>hybrid online offering and have no in-person meetings</u> on campus. All work will be submitted online via **D2L**. Course evaluations will also be conducted online.
- Tuesdays will be <u>asynchronous</u> for the entire term (9/14 12/7), where students will watch prerecorded lectures and complete the associated readings on their own time. <u>The first class meeting on</u> <u>Tue 9/7, however, will be synchronous</u> for the full period to introduce the course structure and various assignments.
- Thursdays will be <u>synchronous</u> for the entire term (9/9 12/2), where students will engage in group discussion with the instructor about the lecture and reading content from that week over Zoom. Class time on Thursdays will remain as scheduled (11am 12:15pm) in its entirety. Students should plan to watch the lectures and complete the reading assignments <u>prior</u> to that week's Zoom session.
- All class meetings and assignment due dates will follow Calgary Mountain Time.
