DESCRIPTION and OBJECTIVES

This course is a continuation of JPNS301. This course covers Lesson 18-22 of the textbook, Genki II. Through a variety of activities, students will learn how to express their own ideas and to use the language creativity both orally and in writing. In this course, students will learn:

- Further acquisition of Japanese characters, and the development of conversational skills through reading and discussion of selected Japanese texts.
- Structural analysis of speech patterns casual and formal conversations.

Constant communications among students will be required to maximise learning in this course, therefore students are required to study Japanese at least 1 hour a day and additional hours for preparing for Tests, Quizzes and Assignments to complete this course successfully. Students are required to fully understand all written texts in Genki textbook up to Lesson 17 to follow this course successfully.

In order to create an immersion experience, students are encouraged to use Japanese in class. Usage of English is minimized in this course, in other words, most correspondence and announcements on D2L will be provided in Japanese with some English words to help students to understand key points.

Prerequisites

JPNS 301, or consent of the School.

[Note] All university level prerequisites for Japanese language courses must be met with a grade of "C-" or better

OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to: 1) have a better understanding of Japanese culture through learning new grammar, Keigo (Honorific, Humble and Extra-modest expressions. 2) express details of their experiences, 3) read and write 79 new kanji; 5) understand authentic Japanese written texts (about 1000 Japanese characters) at the late beginner level.

- Missed Tests and Ouizzes cannot be rescheduled.
- There will be appointment-based tests with the instructor on Zoom. Students have responsibility to take those exams at the assigned time. Please email your instructor if the timing will not work for you (e.g., Childcare or other reasons). No show without prior contact will be subject to zero points.
- All course work assignments, projects and homework have to be done by yourself. Excessive use
 of online resources and support from someone else will take you to a special arranged meeting with
 Japanese language instructors for the oral examination. You will be expected to demonstrate
 competent knowledge of Japanese at your submitted work level to pass this oral examination. This
 oral examination is a pass/fail basis and will consist of 50% of the grade. Please read Academic

- Homework will be graded on a pass/fail basis. Due dates are indicated in D2L.

Academic misconduct

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
