DESCRIPTION

Students will take Japanese language lessons from 9:00 to 12:50 every day and joining various cultural related activities in the afternoon and weekends. This course will provide intensive Japanese language learning through a unique and intensive classroom setting in Senshu University, Japan. Senshu University is situated very close to the center of Tokyo, about 20 minutes by train, which gives students opportunities to visits various venues in Tokyo. The campus is adjacent to a large forest park with many natural trails and gardens. Students can visit attractions in Tokyo as well as enjoy the nature nearby. The entire course will provide students real university life experience in Japan.

Prerequisite: JPNS207

Note: This course is offered during Spring/Summer Sessions in Japan. Students must JPNS309.01, 310.02, and 312.02 to participate in this immersion program.

OBJECTIVES

This program provides international opportunities in the curriculum. Students will gain valuable international experiences by attending a Japanese university, living in an international dormitory, and participating in various activities with Japanese students. This course also provides students opportunities to further develop their Japanese language skills and to experience the culture in an immersion setting. This program also aims to develop participants' Japanese language proficiency and cultural competency via practical exercises/activities that foster language acquisition. Students will have opportunities to converse with Japanese students ("class visitors") and give presentations in Japanese in order to improve their working knowledge of the language.

OUTCOMES

Students will improve their proficiency in the Japanese language. They also will acquire a deep knowledge of Japanese culture through firsthand experience. Students will develop cultural sensitivities throughout the entire program.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following, depending on their placement:

- To be able to discuss topics of interest and express one's opinion using complex sentences (J2 Lower Intermediate level)
- To be able to summarize and express one's ideas and opinions (J3 Intermediate level)
- Understanding how to structure logical writing and speech (J4 Advanced)
