COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This introduction to the study of speech language pathology (SLP) provides students with an overview of the subject, including major facts underlying normal and disordered communication, handicapping conditions dealt with by the profession, and a discussion of broader professional issues.

TOPICS:

Prevalence and classification of communication disorders, overview of the basic components of speech and language, normal development, child language disorders, articulation/phonology disorders, reading and language, voice and resonance disorders, neurogenic speech and language disorders, swallowing disorders, stuttering, augmentative and alternative communication, hearing and hearing impairment, emotional aspects of communication, handicapping conditions impacting communication, employment environments, service delivery models and current professional issues.

COURSE GOALS:

On course completion, the student will be able to

- identify key points related to both normal and disordered communication
- understand the influences of various handicapping conditions on speech, language and swallowing ability
- define key terminology associated with SLP
- discuss professional issues of current concern to SLPs
- appreciate the social/emotional/vocational implications that communication disorders can have on individuals and their families
- make an informed decision with respect to pursuing further education in SLP.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references are explicitly and clearly noted. Some course assignments call for students to work in groups. Unless noted otherwise in writing, students must write up their own answers for submission of the assignment. Failure to do so constitutes plagiarism. Plagiarism is an extremely serious academic offence. Possible penalties for plagiarism include: failing the assignment, failing the course, disciplinary probation, suspension, or expulsion. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another in the commission of plagiarism is also guilty of academic misconduct.
