DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to a variety of topics that underscore the interrelationship of cultures, literatures, philosophy, film, music and visual arts beginning with the Roman Empire through to modern Italy, France and Spain. Historical events and key features of various time periods serve as the framework. Students are exposed to a wide range of sources, including visual art and literary texts. **This course involves extensive reading, active comprehension and engaged participation. Dedication to the readings and active participation in class are expected.**

Objectives

1. By identifying, explaining and interpreting historical, social, philosophical, literary and artistic developments across a wide range of time and diverse geographical areas, students will be able describe how the cultures of Italy, France and Spain came to be what they are today.
2. Students will compare and contrast the interrelationship of these Romance cultures.
3. Students will conduct **scholarly research** leading to an **in-class group presentation** on a topic related to Romance Studies. The topic of your project must be **approved in advance** by the professor. Possible topics, expectations, guidelines and grading rosters will be addressed in class and posted on D2L.

Prerequisites

There are no prerequisites for this course.

COURSE NOTES

1. **Scheduled in-class presentations cannot be postponed.** We will schedule them in class at the beginning of the semester.

2. **Attendance and active participation** are vital to this course. Students may miss **two classes** without penalty. Starting with the **third unexcused absence**, the professor will subtract two points from the final percentage *grade for attendance* per missed class. If you have to miss class due to an emergency or medical condition, please communicate with your professor at your earliest convenience. The professor **may** request a doctor's note or other documentation.

Classroom lectures are supplemented with a variety of information sources, film clips, visual art, etc. Many cultural features presented in class cannot be experienced from lecture notes on their own. Students who miss class are responsible for covering all material presented during an absence.

Attendance at **all examinations** is compulsory. Missed exams/tests will be given a grade of F. A student who is absent from an exam or test for legitimate reasons must inform the instructor immediately.

- **Electronic submission of assignments:**

Peer feedback assignments will be submitted online through D2L. More information to follow.

Students are expected to submit all other assignments **on paper directly to the professor. Be sure to submit all components of assigned work on the due date.** *Late assignments will lose 5% per day.*

The Department's **drop-box**, located in the foyer area of the third floor in Craigie Hall between blocks D and C, is available for depositing assignments. The material placed in the drop-box will be collected and date-stamped at the beginning and at the end of the working day.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any

person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
