DESCRIPTION

This course will give students an opportunity to approach global humanities in a manner that shows the relationship between the culture of the past and life in the present. This course will examine the arts and ideas of the West in relation to those of other world cultures, including India, East Asia, Africa, and Native America, with a special focus on French, Italian and Spanish landscapes in Literature and Film. Students will learn about European literature, film, art history and geography, with a particular attention to the different Mediterranean cultures and cityscapes.

Objectives: The purpose of this course is to introduce undergraduate students to French, Italian and Spanish literature, film, art history, culture and society (food and fashion included), through the variety of Mediterranean's landscapes and cityscapes, as portrayed by major poets, painters, novelists and directors. Three written assignments and two exams will provide an occasion for testing students' work in progress. Final paper should be envisaged and organized as the journey students would finally like to experience: through their readings and their favorite Italian, French and Spanish sites, cities and landscapes.

COURSE NOTES

The course will consist in lectures devoted to the major aspects of French, Italian and Spanish civilizations, with a specific focus on history, art history, film literature and culture; analyses and seminar discussions will be in English. Active participation in class will be expected and encouraged. Oral presentation & Final paper: the oral presentation and final paper will deal extensively with a theme discussed in class. The topic will be agreed with the instructor. The paper will have a length of 5/8 pages, in English. There will be no final exam.

Missed tests and missed assignments will be counted as 0 and will contribute to the calculation of the final mark.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. Plagiarism is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. Cheating at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the nonauthorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
