DESCRIPTION

This beginner language course introduces students to the specifics of Russian pronunciation and intonation, the Cyrillic alphabet, the principal concepts of Russian language structure as they differ from English, as well as basic vocabulary. The course lays a foundation for the further study of Russian, and thus special attention is paid to the understanding and recognition of the grammatical categories unfamiliar to speakers of English, such as gender and case of nouns, conjugation of verbs, and the notion of grammatical agreement. In-class activities include oral comprehension and communication exercises and drills facilitating the acquisition of all the necessary language skills.

The course's content and format meet the standards of the Common European Framework of Languages and will thus serve as a great start on the road to certification within the framework, allowing the student a multitude of opportunities for employment all over the world that require the knowledge of Russian.

The course has no prerequisites. It may not be repeated for credit.

OBJECTIVES

The course aims to introduce students to

- the Russian sound system,
- basic grammatical structures,
- high-frequency Russian vocabulary,
- the Cyrillic alphabet, and
- aspects of Russian culture.

OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of the course, students will

- understand the principles of Russian spelling and pronunciation,
- have acquired over 350 words and phrases,
- know how to categorize Russian words into parts of speech by their form and meaning,
- know the basic grammatical categories, which, together with the vocabulary, will enable them (1) to carry out short conversations in Russian on topics relevant for everyday life, (2) to follow simple written texts, and (3) to express themselves in writing within the limits of the covered material,
- and have had glimpses into Russian history and have gained familiarity with contemporary Russia.

Regularly participating in classes (speaking up during discussions, volunteering to ask and answer questions) and completing group work in class constitute active class participation. Class sessions are your main course opportunities for practicing and speaking Russian, and speaking is one skill that the course develops.

Policy for late assignments

Hand-in homework is due by the designated class date on time. Regular homework is of utmost importance in order to follow the pace and succeed in this course. Contact the instructor by e-mail as soon as possible, if you will not be able to submit your assignment by or on the due date. A deduction of 10% per class day late may apply to the assignment's final grade in the absence of a strong reason for why you will submit



your homework late. (Thus, if a homework assignment is due on Wednesday 15 September, and you submit it on Wednesday 22 September, it will have been late by three class days, and 30% will be deducted from its final grade.)

Google Translate and other online translation services

You are not permitted to use Google Translate or any other online translation services for any work in this course. The use of Google Translate or any other online translation services will be considered Academic Dishonesty and reported as such (please see explanation of Academic Dishonesty below).

Policy on use of aids

No aids are allowed during quizzes and tests. The use of aids during quizzes and tests will be considered Academic Dishonesty and reported as such (please see explanation below).

ASSESSMENT

- **4 quizzes** in class that will have two parts: a dictation part and a vocabulary quiz part. Each quiz will be worth 3% (4 X 3% = 12%). No aids allowed. They will be held on the following days: Monday 20 September, Wednesday 13 October, Monday 01 November, and Wednesday 29 November.
- 3 two-part chapter tests. Each chapter test will have a dictation part and a written part. Both parts will be completed in class. Written parts will be worth 10% and dictation parts will be worth 3%. Each chapter test, then, will be worth 13% (10% + 3%). No aids allowed. They will be held on the following days: Friday 8 October, Friday 5 November, and Wednesday 8 December.
- **Hand-in homework exercises.** These exercises are required throughout the term. They include written, writing, and oral exercises. Aids are allowed with the exception of Google Translate and any other online translation services, which are **not** allowed. Look at the schedule and slides for specific details and instructions.
- **Self-marking homework exercises**. These exercises are required throughout the term. You complete them online at https://www.sputniktextbook.org. You must complete them no later than one week after they are assigned. If you earn 85% or higher on an exercise, you receive 10/10 for that exercise. Any mark below 85% on an assignment reduces your mark on that exercise. Thus, 65% on an exercise will earn you 6.5/10 for that exercise. You can complete the assignments as many times as you want, in an effort to earn the strongest results. If you complete an assignment later than one week after it is assigned, you receive 0 (zero) for the assignment.
