DESCRIPTION

An advanced Russian course approached from a particular thematic perspective—food. Both language and food are fundamental to human existence; they also play a central role in culture and identity. Both are, on the one hand, highly personal, and, on the other, collective in nature. The topic of food provides a multitude of possibilities not only for conversational practice and comprehensive grammar review, but also for linguistic analysis. It gives a glimpse into the language history, not to mention the cultural context and the emotive plane of language.

OBJECTIVES

- -To combine language and culture components focussing on the subject of food in order to deepen the knowledge and mastery of the language and to practice its usage in contexts approximating reality
- -To learn about major celebrations and be able to discuss meals associated with them, including preparation
- -To enlarge vocabulary and practice idiomatic usage
- -To get acquainted with proverbs and sayings related to food and eating
- -To engage in translation using various media, such as film, animation, music, art, printed and Internet sources
- -To study foreign borrowings related to Russia's culinary history
- -To learn about speech etiquette
- -To gain understanding of word-formation
- -To analyze syntactic constructions specific to the topic

OUTCOMES

Besides the acquisition of advanced skills and a more profound understanding of the usage and the structure of Russian, insight into the expressive and emotive side of language and the function of metaphor and analogy will be achieved.

The students will obtain an increased level of register awareness and gain the ability to use different registers in various contexts involving food. They will also develop a more sophisticated appreciation of traditions surrounding culinary practices and experiences during various historical periods.

COURSE NOTES

Students need to have reliable access to technology, as follows:

Since this is a language class, the students are expected to attend the class and do homework regularly, come to class prepared, and actively participate in class activities.

The tests will take place on February 27 and March 29. **No aids are allowed**. The tests will be made available on D2L (Content, under Tests) for 24 hours from the class starting time on the specified dates, and are due for submission after the time has elapsed. The test should be completed on a separate sheet of paper; once completed, it should be scanned and submitted to the designated Dropbox.

The holiday conversation sessions will take place on February 17 and April 12 and align with two historically celebrated occasions, *Maslenitsa* and Easter. Further information regarding preparation and participation in the sessions will be provided on D2L.

Missed assignments and tests will result in the grade of 0; special consideration may be given due to extenuating circumstances. The instructor should be informed of any reasons for a prolonged absence. Assignments should be submitted by the deadline.

Work submitted for grading should be done solely by the student. Using online translators,



translation software or apps, consulting with another person, or copying work produced by someone else is not permitted and constitutes academic dishonesty.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test):
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
