DESCRIPTION

A comprehensive course for students with no prior knowledge of Spanish, focused on listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills having to do with immediate needs in everyday situations. Emphasis on intercultural awareness of Spanish-speaking cultures.

OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course, students will increase their skills in listening comprehension, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural awareness and will be able to:

- 1. Exchange essential information in basic oral and written conversations and presentations.
- 2. Read and understand short, simple texts.
- 3. Write simple paragraphs about themselves and others.
- 4. Demonstrate limited control of the present indicative tense.
- 5. Demonstrate awareness of Spanish-speaking cultures.

OUTCOMES

Outcomes in language courses are usually measured in terms of five basic skills:

Listening: You will understand, at least partially, audio and video material such as that which accompanies the textbook. However, in a simple face-to-face conversation, misunderstanding of both the main ideas and details can still arise on a fairly regular basis.

Speaking: You will be able to ask and answer simple questions using a very limited vocabulary concerning immediate surroundings; you are able to introduce yourself and talk about likes and dislikes, express plans and obligations and talk about everyday activities. However, you are not able to engage effectively in prolonged interactions with native speakers.

Reading: You will be able to understand the main ideas in simple authentic material (brochures, advertisement, schedules, and short newspaper articles) and to extract information from them by applying some reading strategies (identifying cognates, scanning, dealing with unfamiliar words, predicting, and activating background knowledge).

Writing: You will be able to write simple texts, such as e-mails, complete sentences and short paragraphs descriptions, to give information about yourself and to describe and narrate events grounded in personal experience.

Culture: You are able to understand some of the significant differences between Hispanic cultures and your own culture, in terms of behavior, attitudes, and values. You have an awareness of language as an essential element of culture.

These outcomes align with the three modes of communication, which will be emphasized in this course:

- Interpretive (listening and reading)
- Interpersonal (conversational speaking and writing)
- Presentational (prepared speaking and writing)

ASSESSMENT

Active Participation and homework: 9% Individual Small Projects (written and oral) (3 x 7%): 21% Chapter Tests (5 x 8%): 40% Cultural Activities (5 X 4%) 20% Tutorials/Labs (10 sessions): 10% Total: 100%



There will be <u>no</u> final exam in this course.

Active participation and homework: Participating fully and completing all activities for any in person or asynchronous sessions is expected. Class sessions are the primary venue for practicing and speaking Spanish, and speaking is one of the skills that this course develops. As such, regular attendance and participation are key to success in this course. Participation includes following instructions given, speaking up during discussions and during activities and volunteering to ask and answer questions. Each instructor will provide guidelines on how to participate fully. Failure to abide by the class etiquette and guidelines listed above will result in a deduction to the participation grade. Each instructor will provide instructions for homework assignments. Homework assignments must be completed by the deadline and could involve but are not limited to D2L quizzes (for practice), audio/video recordings, listening practice, vocabulary practice, and grammar practice.

Chapter Tests: At the end of each chapter, a quiz will be completed in D2L that will involve, reading, writing, listening, vocabulary and grammar. You may use your textbook when taking these quizzes. Do not use an online translator. Do not consult with any other individuals.

Cultural Activities: These will accompany each chapter and will involve responding to the prompt in the D2L discussion forum in order to delve deeper into the cultural concepts presented in each chapter.

Individual Small Projects: These 3 small projects offer a chance to speak or write what has been taught in some chapters. The projects will be posted in the D2L discussion forum or turned in via the D2L Dropbox. More instructions will be provided for each project.

Guidelines for submitting assignments, and expectations for writing quality: Assignments must be submitted on D2L and/or through the textbook's online platform by the assigned deadline. The use of online translators is not permitted, and any assignments which utilize a translator will result in a grade of zero for that assignment. Instead, use what you have learned in the textbook and use an online dictionary.

Policy in case of missed or late assignments: If individual circumstances prevent a student from meeting a course deadline, it is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor as soon as possible if the student wishes to request credit for any missed online activities.

Tutorials/Labs: Labs meet once per week starting on September 12. Students are expected to attend their assigned lab, follow the instructions of their instructor, and complete all activities. These are designed to further skills developed in Spanish and review and practice the material covered in the course.

The timely completion of all assignments, in addition to respecting and following all procedures, is necessary to pass this course.
